An eye chart test is designed to measure your visual acuity, which essentially tells your doctor how clearly your eyes can see at different distances. While it may look like you're just reading ...

Pinhole visual acuity test: Pinhole visual acuity tests diagnose nearsightedness. Your eye care specialist will ask you to look through a paddle that has one (or a few) tiny holes in it.

For this test, the child sits in a chair 10 feet from the chart, gently holding an eye cover over one eye. The parent or caregiver points to each E, starting with the largest E.
